For the next two books, please select from the provided book lists, but your choices need to be different genres. Once back into school, you will also be presenting on one of these to the class as well. I will provide that direction and guidelines later, just be sure you know your books!

Meanwhile, for all three books:

1) While reading, **novel code/annotate the entire book**.

2)	After reading the two books you selected, follow the response process below per book.

- 2. Bring your five completed paragraph answers for the two books of your choice as well as the response for *The Outsiders*.

Reminders

- Type your paragraphs using Times New Roman, 12-point font and double-space the responses.
- For the two books you select, type the questions you are answering at the top of the page.
- Paragraphs are indented.
- Names are capitalized as the first and main words in a title.
- Titles are italicized.

1. Describe the personality, appearance, and behaviors of TWO round characters in the story. Round characters are fully realized characters that come into conflict with each other and other characters in believable ways, spurring character development.

- 2. S. E. Hinton writes with imagery. Locate a section in the book (2-4 sentences) where her words painted a picture in your mind, and write it exactly as it appears below.
- 3. Name a character and state his or her tragic flaw. Cite an example in the book that proves this.
- 4. Cite an example of dramatic irony from the book. Write what the reader knew before the character(s) did.
- 5. S.E. Hinton uses a great deal of foreshadowing in the book. Cite an example of foreshadowing and explain what it was, and how it played out. Hint: there is foreshadowing used in the first few pages.
- 6. How was this book similar to Romeo and Juliet? List one similarity and explain.
- 7. In your opinion, was there a tragic hero in this story? Why or why not? Explain
- 8. What do you think Freytag's Pyramid looks like for this story? (See attachment as a reminder)
- 9. Write about one connection you made to this book. What in this book reminded you of something in your personal experience?
- 10. **Theme of the book?** Write a **phrase** that captures the theme. **Defend why you think so.** Ex.: Good vs. Evil. Hard work pays off. Love conquers all. (Note, these are just examples of a theme. They may not be a theme of the books you read. You may need to generate ones of your own.)



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

the meaning using examples from the book.


